






You have the right to change physicians

have the right to refuse care; this is called the conscience








You have the right

According to the law, a healthcare professional cannot refuse to treat someone based on their gender, origin, pregnancy, physical appearance, sexual orientation, etc. In reality, certain kinds of discrimination still exist. If you do not feel comfortable, you have the right to change physicians.

You do not have to justify yourself, even to your former physician!

If it is your treating physician, you must declare a new one so that you can be refunded through the coordinated healthcare circuit.

They don't have the right to do so based on discriminatory reasons or depending on your type of healthcare coverage.

If a physician refuses to carry out treatment, they must inform you immediately, transfer your file to the physician that you have chosen or tell you where you can go.

You have the right to request explanations from your physician until you understand.



Not only do you have the right to be informed regarding the state of your health, but, in addition, the law requires that you "freely and knowledgeably consent" to all proposed medical acts and treatments.

Adult patients can designate a person whom they trust.
This must be done in writing.

Your confidante can, upon your request, escort you throughout all of your medical procedures and consultations.

You have the right to privacy.
Any information that you may
give under the framework
of a consultation remains
confidential.

With your consent, your information can be sent to other professionals to facilitate your care.

This clause doesn't apply in the case of urgent care.

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If you do not want your parents

If you do not want your parents
to know about the state of
your health, you can always ask
that your information be kept
confidential (if you use drugs, for
example, or to get contraception).

In certain circumstances, you will need to be accompanied by an adult of your choice. This could be a cousin, a friend's older brother, teacher, etc.
